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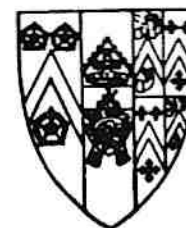

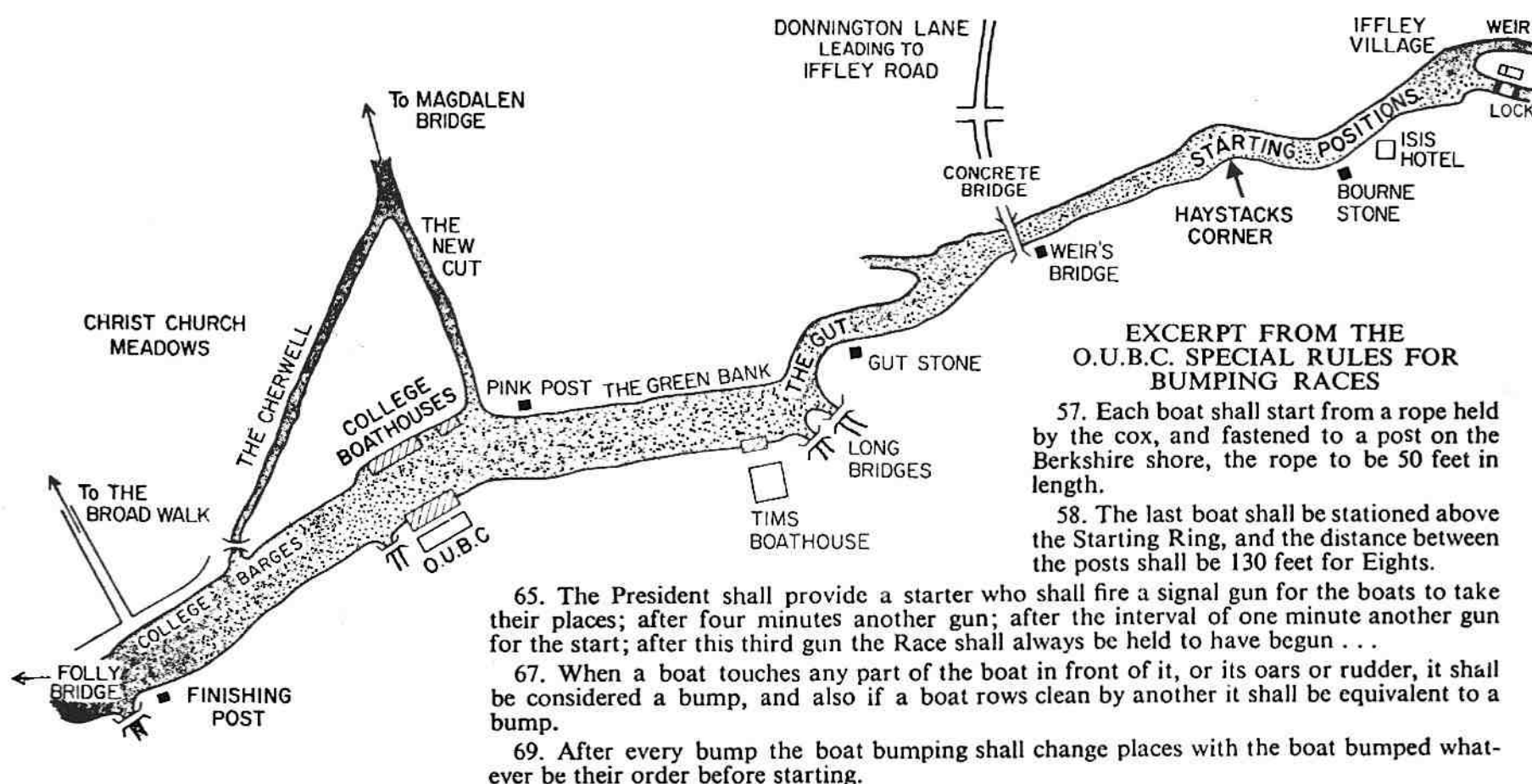
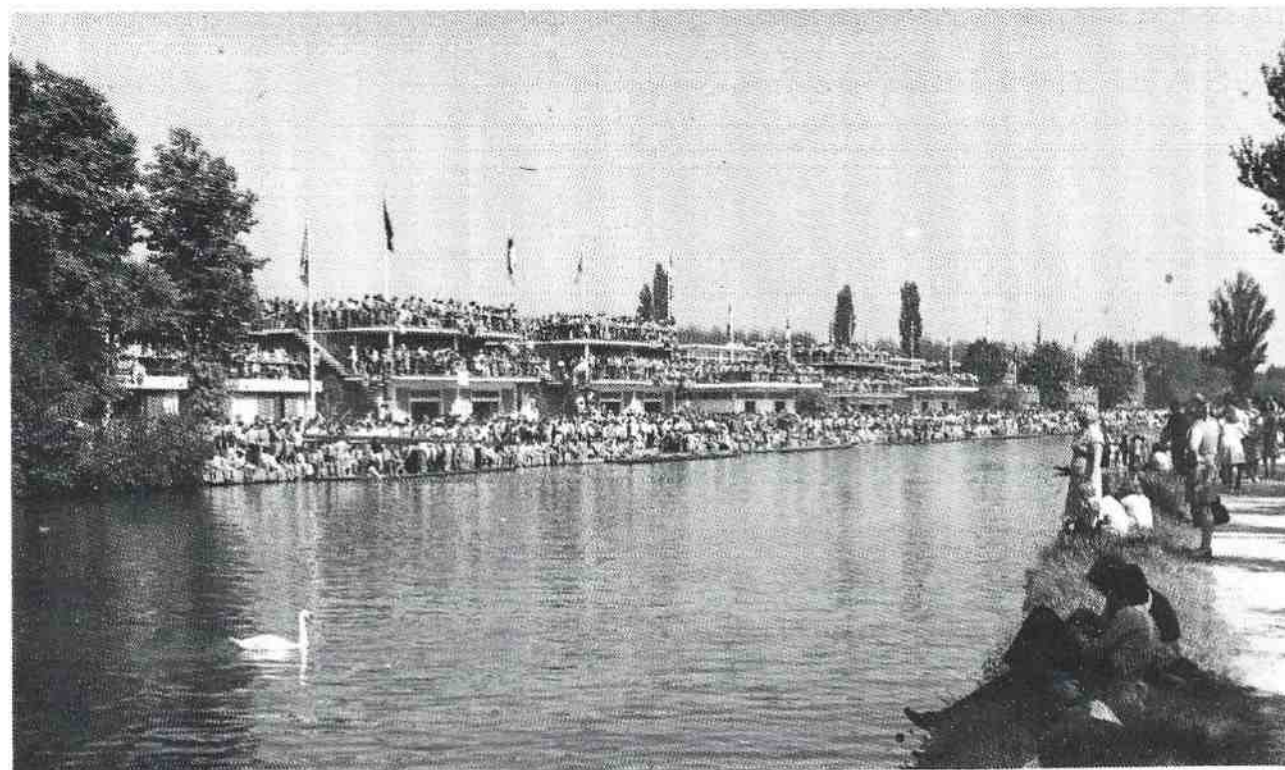

ROWING JARGON

Touch her... hold her hard...don't bum shove...get your blade in ...slide smoothly up...no washing out....go for the bump....now give her ten...hands away....easy.

Boats to all intents and purposes are female, capricious, delicate and hard to handle, so often you will hear the coxes (yes, that's what I said) shouting out some fairly strange commands, such as those above, to try and bring some semblance of control to the proceedings. What does it all mean? Most people know that the *stern* is the sharp end and the *bows* the blunt end (or is it the other way round?), but did you know that a *stretcher* is not something on which the oarsman is carried away after the race but a wooden frame which holds his *shoes*? The oarsman inserts his feet into the fixed shoes whilst his body goes up and down on the *slide* to *front stops* and *back stops*, while he holds onto the *loom* of the *blade*, which rests in a *gate* attached to the *sax board* of the boat by a *rigger*. But of course you knew that already.

The start is from fixed stations on the bank by means of a *bung line*. Crews go off at a high *rating*, 35-40 strokes per minute, and then settle down to a *stride*. Ideally, a crew will be *chaining*, that is to say the puddles from one stroke will form a continuous pattern with those from the next stroke, any gap between these sets of puddles being called *clearance*, the more *clearance* the better

Things do not always go well, and in the lower divisions this provides plenty of excitement. You will be able to see examples of *washing out*, that is finishing the stroke too early so bringing up a lot of spray, and of course on occasions one may finish the stroke too late, in which case the oar may be held in the water by the speed of the boat, and the oarsman may end up being thrown bodily out of the boat. This is called *catching a crab*.

When a boat is close to the crew in front, the cox may shout *give her ten* — this is a sign for the crew to make an extra effort, which with luck will result in their impaling the stern (or is it the bow?) of the boat in front on their bow (or is it stern?), so getting *the bump*.

Which brings us back to where we started. *Touch her* means that one oarsman should take a stroke in order to line the boat up in the correct direction at the start; *hold her hard* is a panic stations command which means 'stop the boat as quickly as possible as we are about to hit something'; *bum shoving* is sliding backwards before the blade is properly in the water, so wasting leg power; *hands away* and *easy* are self-explanatory, but for the uninitiated they mean 'stop now, you have finished'. Rowing, I mean!

The President's Address

This week sees the biggest sporting and social event of the Oxford Summer Calendar. With over one thousand oarsman and oarswomen competing, rowing is by far the largest participant sport at Oxford, and with the many thousands who come to watch every year, Summer Eights ranks as the most popular of all the intercollegiate competition. This popularity is due in many respects to the amount of time and effort put in by its organisers both at University level, with the O.U.B.C. and its helpers ensuring smooth running of the races, and at College level, with the bars ensuring smooth running of the pirms and ale!

The immense interest in the sport, shown by the increasing number of participants in recent years, is due partly, I think, to the success that Oxford have had in the last three Boat Races. In 1976 we had the record breaking, both fastest and heaviest crew. 1977 saw the biggest winning margin in an Oxford win, and this year we witnessed the most exciting race for a good few years despite the deplorable Cambridge tactics at the start and their inability to stay afloat to the finish. Unfortunately we were not as successful in the other "Boat Races". Both Isis and the lightweights lost narrowly after extremely hard and close races and our women found themselves up against a crew of unusually high standard. One of my aims as President of O.U.B.C. for next year is to attain total Oxford supremacy. We, at Oxford, have all the facilities we need to do this; we have support, financially and otherwise from companies such as Ladbroke's and Dewhurst to whom we are indebted, and certainly, we possess all the equipment necessary. What we require is the manpower, or should I say "personpower", to carry it off. Successful 'Varsity' rowing is based on good College rowing. Unfortunately the latter only exists for a few weeks in the year and certainly, the majority of it is packed up and locked away by about seven o'clock on the Saturday of Eights Week. Oxford needs experienced oarsmen and women. So I ask those of you competing here and coming back next year to carry on rowing, at whatever your standard, after this week and when you go home, or whatever, at the end of term, join your local rowing club and find out for yourselves that there is more to rowing than just four days competition in the year.

But, getting back to these four days, last year saw some excellent racing with quite a high standard of rowing especially in the first division. The majority of Colleges had some degree of success somewhere along the line and I feel sure that the standard will be even higher this year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Andrew Michelmore for the incredible job he has done as President over the last year here. After Eights Week the OUBC persuaded six colleges to send their 1st VIIIs to Henley Regatta. Oxford was making a determined effort to swamp the expected Cambridge invasion. Magdalen, Christ Church, Trinity, Exeter, Merton and Balliol were set to go, and Oxford had entries in every event in the Regatta. The Captain of Balliol Boat Club was an Australian Rhodes Scholar named Hugh Cairns. Hugh was a gregarious man, with many friends, among whom was Rudyard Kipling. Hugh brought him onto training table in hall, one night before we left for Henley. Mr. Kipling appeared much interested in rowing, and our chances at Henley.

empty manner. He complied cheerily. Hugh Cairns said the house the College had rented for our two weeks at the Regatta would accommodate Mr. Kipling in addition to the 14 of us (Hugh was taking five substitutes as well as the VIII). Two days later we made our first appearance on the river at Henley.

Mr. Kipling was all attention, a stop watch concealed in his pocket, timing the crews that were rowing 'courses'. Since he could see starts from the Leander Club enclosure opposite the finishing post, he was able to time all our likely opposition in the first few days. Nobody knew what he was doing. He was as furtive as a Newmarket Clocker at early-morning gallops. He said the only other spy he detected was a bishop whose pink Leander cap clashed so violently with his purple bib that nobody in the enclosure could take his eyes off him. This dramatic disturbance fascinated Kipling. Greatly impressed with the influx of rowing clergy, he was convinced that a superb and stately crew composed entirely of bishops and deans, who were members of Leander, could be put on the river for a five-hundred yard display.

A hero to us all, Kipling might have been just another don as he curled up in a big chair with his mug of Balliol ale. He listened, talked a bit, laughed a lot and seemed to have a good time, whether he heard about the merits of swivel rowlocks, the virtues of the newest 'Lady Devorguilla' or the usual small talk of the training table. By the time we broke up, it had been arranged that Mr. Kipling would accompany us to Henley. We had adopted him in a pre-

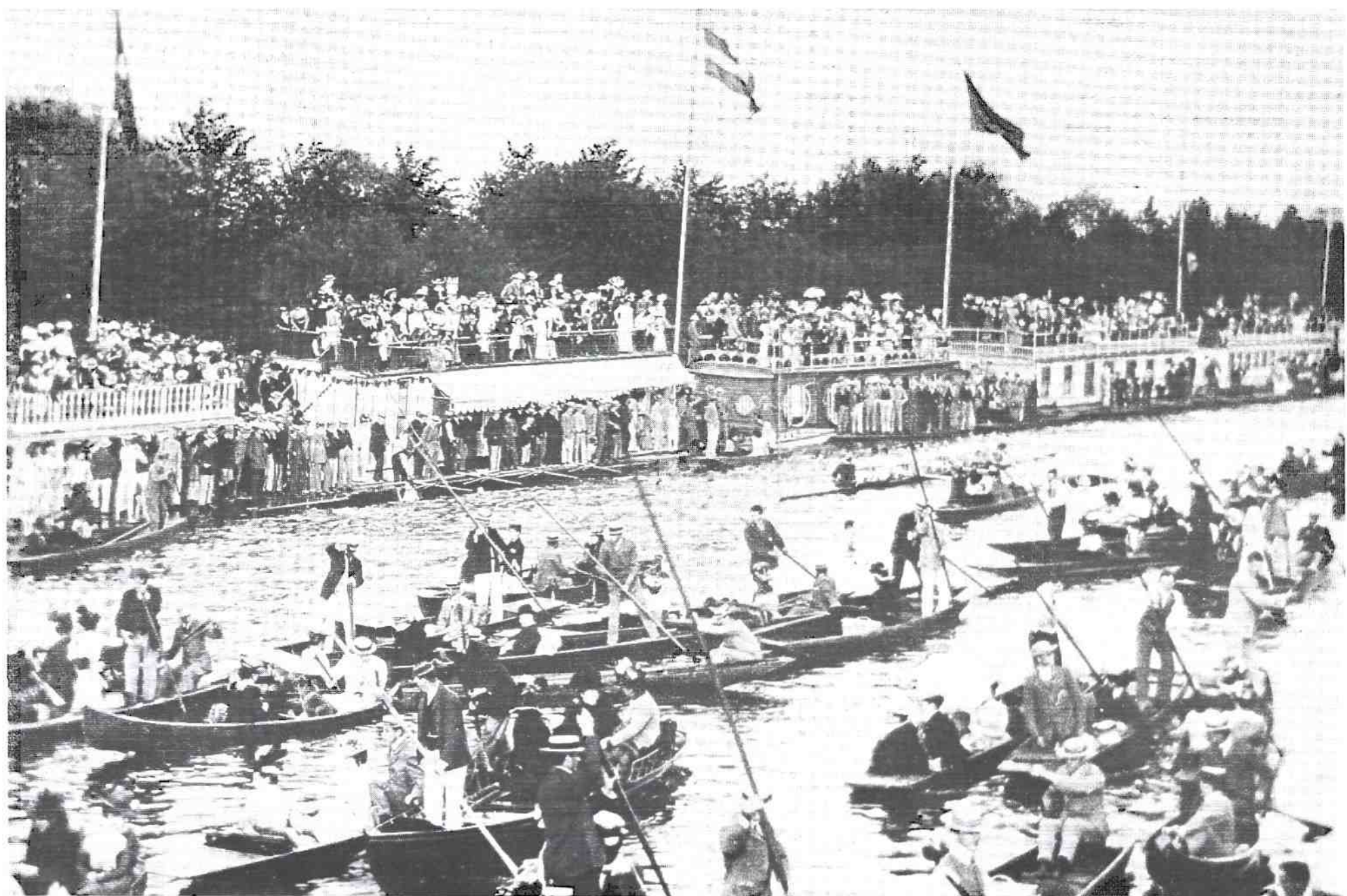

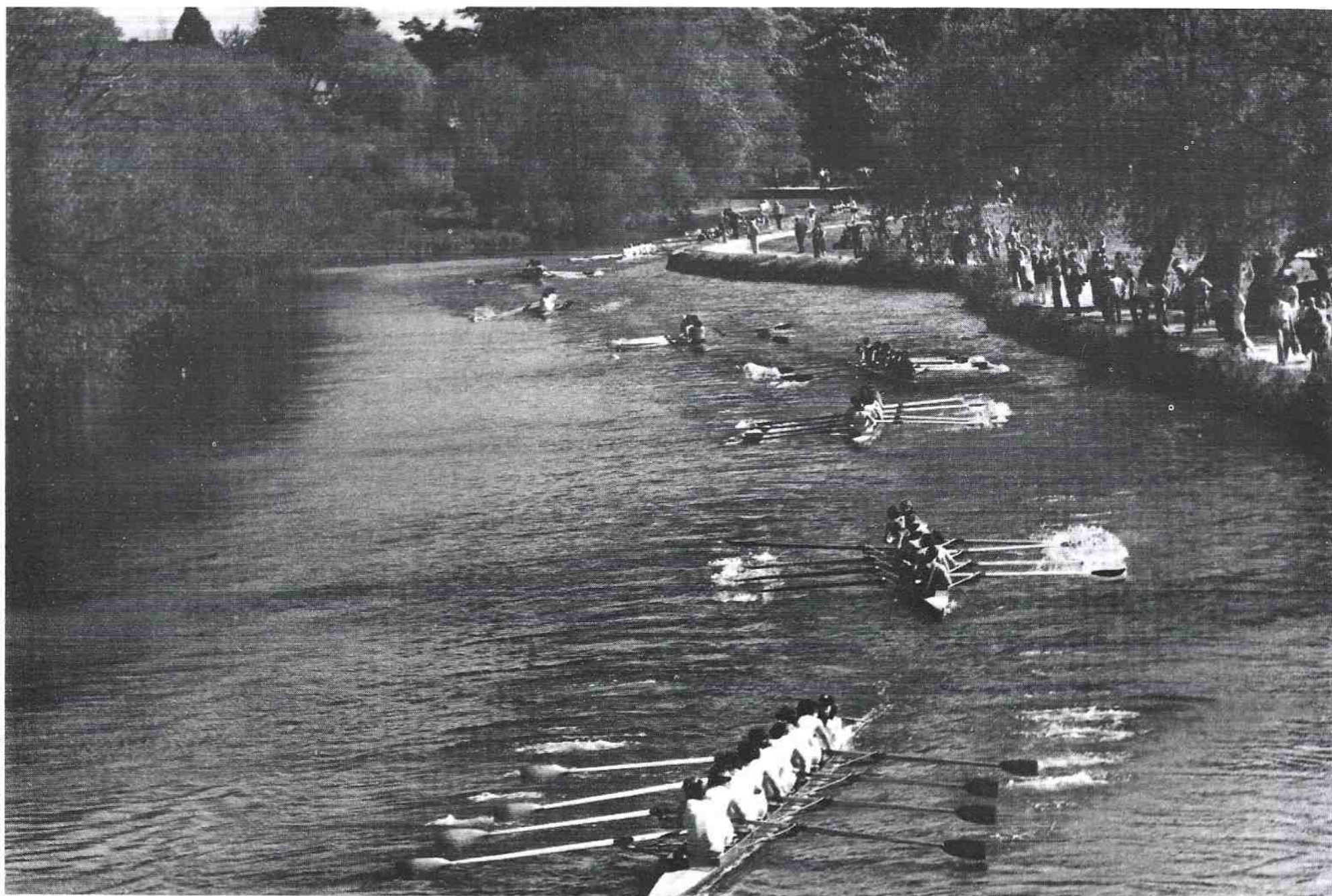

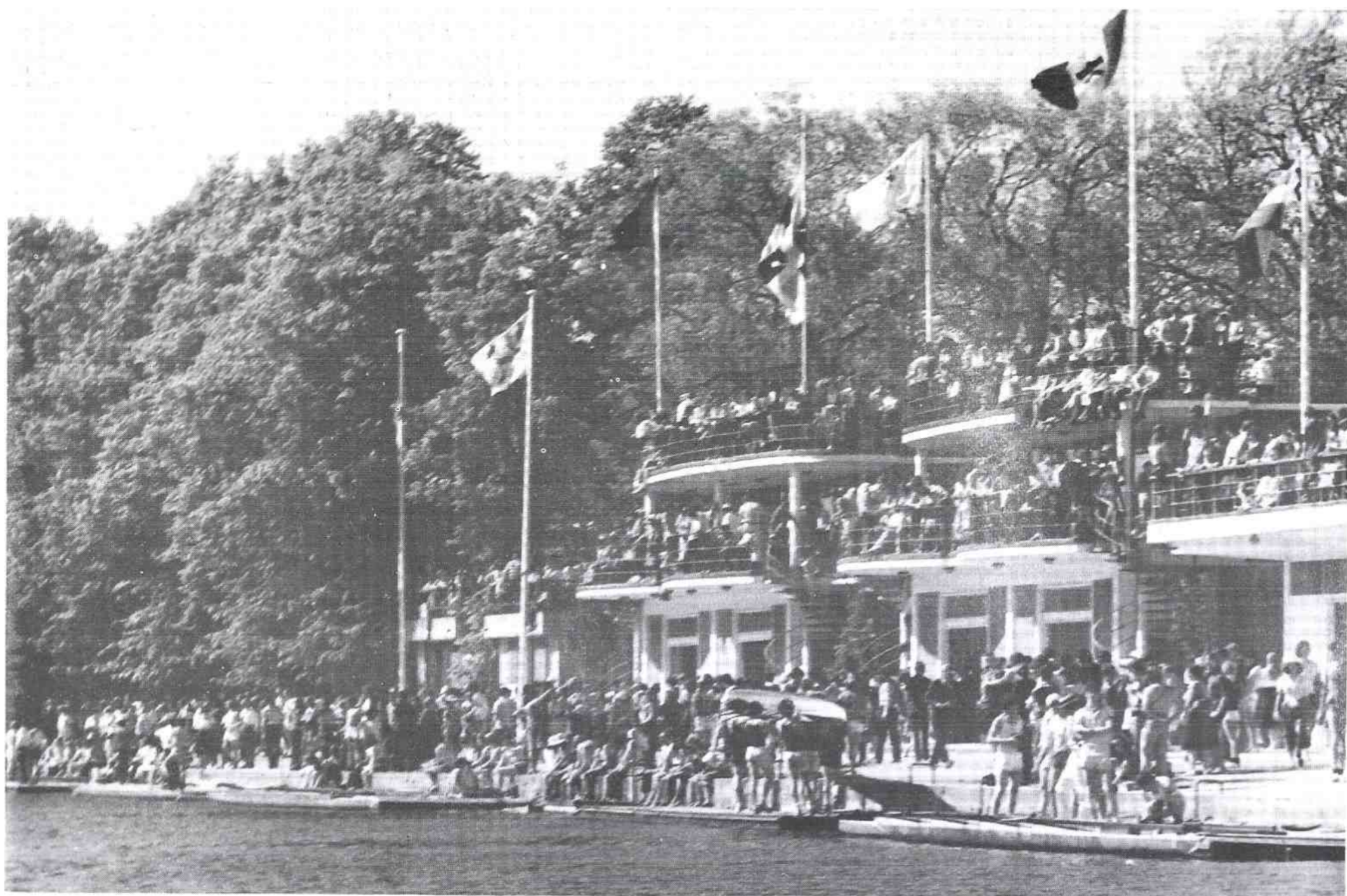
Summer Eights, 1907, On The Start

An Aesthetic View of Eights

"There are few prettier spectacles of bright young life than Oxford during Eights Week. Sweet English girls, the glory of creation, flit through the old colleges and down the Broad Walk in company, 'bien entendu', with that other glory of creation, the Oxford undergraduate. All is life, and mirth and happiness. Then a sudden stillness smites the barges we are on, and with parted lips and straining eyes every man is gazing at the stream. There is a tense moment and every man is on his feet. Forgotten are father, mother, sister, brother and the dearer one yet. All these inconsiderable trifles count for nothing, for we have not made our "bump", and is not the whole sum of a lifetime's joy concentrated in a wild shout of, "O, well rowed!"

Personally, I have never encountered at Eights Week the phenomena recounted by the Ward, Lock 'Guide to Oxford' of 1928. The "glory of creation" these days appears to consist of Laura Ashleyed hordes stumbling from one boathouse to the other in a quest for free drink with the men stumbling after in a quest for both. Somewhere, in the middle distance, there are boats; Eights - it must be affirmed - is nothing whatsoever to do with these. It is there for the entertainment of a number of people who, for the past five weeks, have been getting up at 8.30 in the morning to operate them, cutting rather a dash as they nimbly (or otherwise) limber up in tight fitting shorts in preparation for the opportunity of boating past the people they have come to observe, upon the bank. TOM BROWN AT OXFORD

The Captain and Miller, the cox, mustered the crew at the gates and walked off to the boats. A dozen other crews were making their way in the same direction, and half the undergraduates of Oxford streamed along with them. The banks of the river were crowded; and the punts plied rapidly backwards and forwards, carrying loads of men over to the Berkshire side. The University barge, and all the other barges, were decked with flags, and the band was playing lively airs as the St. Ambrose crew reached the scene of action.

No time was lost in the dressing-room, and in two minutes they were all standing in flannel trousers and silk jerseys at the landing-place.

"You had better keep your jackets on", said the captain; "we shan't be off yet."

"There goes Brazen-nose." - "They look like work, don't they?"

"The black and yellow seems to slip along so fast. They're no end of good colours. I wish our new boat was black." - "Hang her colours, if she's only stiff in the back and don't dip."

"There go Balliol, and Oriel, and University."

"By Jove, we shall be late! Where's Miller?"

"In the shed, getting the boat out. Look, here's Exeter."

The talk of the crew was silenced for the moment as every man looked eagerly at the Exeter boat. The captain nodded to Jervis with a grim smile as they paddled gently by.

"Not so badly. They're very strong in the middle of the boat." - "Not a bit of it: it's all lumber."

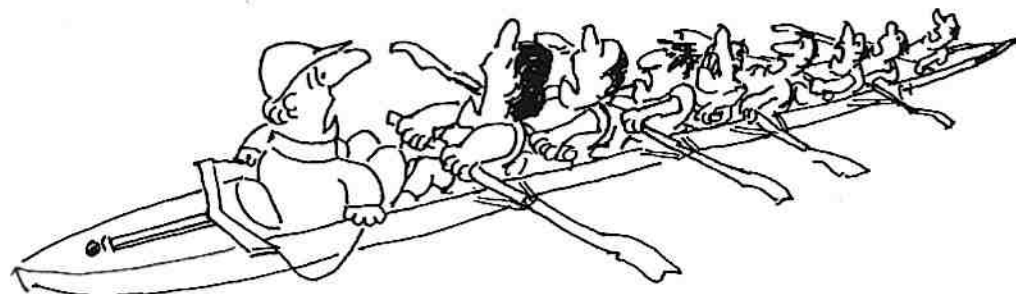

"You're gaining! you're gaining!" he now and then mutters to the captain, who responds with a wink, keeping his breath for other matters. Isn't he grand, the captain, as he comes forward like lightning, stroke after stroke, his back flat, his teeth set, his whole frame working from the hips with the regularity of a machine? As the space still narrows, the eyes of the fiery little coxswain flash with excitement, but he is far too good a judge to hurry the final effort before the victory is safe in his grasp.

Tom fancied now he could hear their oars and the workings of their rudder, and the voice of their coxswain. In another moment both boats are in the Gut, and a perfect

storm of shouts reaches them from the crowd as it rushes madly off to the left to the footbridge, amidst which "Oh, well steered, well steered, St. Ambrose!" is the prevailing cry. Then Miller, motionless as a statue till now, lifts his right hand and whirls the tassle round his head: "Give it her now, boys; six strokes and we're into them."
