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
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

Boats to all intents and purposes are female, capricious, delicate and hard to handle, so often you will hear the coxes (yes, that's what I said) shouting out some fairly strange commands, such as those above, to try and bring some semblance of control to the proceedings. What does it all mean? Most people know that the stern is the sharp end and the bows the blunt end (or is it the other way round?), but did you know that a stretcher is not something on which the oarsman is carried away after the race but a wooden frame which holds his shoes? The oarsman inserts his feet into the fixed shoes whilst his body goes up and down on the slide to front stops and back stops, while he holds onto the loom of the blade, which rests in a gate attached to the sax board of the boat by a rigger. But of course you knew that already.

The start is from fixed stations on the bank by means of a bung line. Crews go off at a high rating, 35-40 strokes per minute, and then settle down to a stride. Ideally, a crew will be chaining, that is to say the puddles from one stroke will form a continuous pattern with those from the next stroke, any gap between these sets of puddles being called clearance, the more clearance the better

Things do not always go well, and in the lower divisions this provides plenty of excitement. You will be able to see examples of washing out, that is finishing the stroke too early so bringing up a lot of spray, and of course on occasions one may finish the stroke too late, in which case the oar may be held in the water by the speed of the boat, and the oarsman may end up being thrown bodily out of the boat. This is called catching a crab.

When a boat is close to the crew in front, the cox may shout give her ten — this is a sign for the crew to make an extra effort, which with luck will result in their impaling the stern (or is it the bow?) of the boat in front on their bow (or is it stern?), so getting the bump.

Which brings us back to where we started. Touch her means that one oarsman should take a stroke in order to line the boat up in the correct direction at the start; hold her hard is a panic stations command which means 'stop the boat as quickly as possible as we are about to hit something'; bum shoving is sliding backwards before the blade is properly in the water, so wasting leg power; hands away and easy are self-explanatory, but for the uninitiated they mean 'stop now, you have finished'. Rowing, I mean!





### The President's Address

This week sees the biggest sporting and social event of the Oxford Summer Calendar. With over one thousand oarsman and oarswomen competing, rowing is by far the largest participant sport at Oxford, and with the many thousands who come to watch every year, Summer Eights ranks as the most popular of all the intercollegiate competition. This popularity is due in many respects to the amount of time and effort put in by its organisers both at University level, with the O.UB.C. and its helpers ensuring smooth running of the races, and at College level, with the bars ensuring smooth running of the pimms and ale!

The immense interest in the sport, shown by the increasing number of participants in recent years, is due partly, I think, to the success that Oxford have had in the last three Boat Races. In 1976 we had the record breaking, both fastest and heaviest crew. 1977 saw the biggest winning margin in an Oxford win, and this year we witnessed the most exciting race for a good few years despite the deplorable Cambridge tactics at the start and their inability to stay afloat to the finish. Unfortunately we were not as successful in the other "Boat Races". I would like to take this opportunity to thank Andrew Michelmore for the incredible job he has done as President over the last year here. He has achieved in helping Oxford rowing so much during his two years here. Also thanks must go to the O.U.B.C. Committee for running the show and to all the competitors and spectators who ensure its existence. Thanks also go to the OTC for its invaluable help with communications, The Queen's College and its groundsman, Mr Beasley for their co-operation in allowing the transport of equipment through their grounds, and finally to the Boatmen whose patience and hardwork ensure that all the boats are raceworthy and get off to a good start.

For some competitors, the active side of this week ended last Friday-I hope you enjoy the rest and better luck next year. For those who are still rowing may I wish you all good luck and a safe dry journey.






Summer Eights, 1907, On The Start

## An Aesthetic View of Eights

Sweet English girls, the glory of creation, flit through the old colleges and down the Broad Walk in company, 'bien entendu', with that other glory of creation, the Oxford undergraduate. All is life, and mirth and happiness. Then a sudden stillness smites the barges we are on, and with parted lips and straining eyes every man is gazing at the stream. There is a tense moment and every man is on his feet. Forgotten are father, mother, sister, brother and the dearer one yet. All these inconsiderable trifles count for nothing, for we have not made our "bump", and is not the whole sum of a lifetime's joy concentrated in a wild shout of, "0, well rowed! "

Personally, I have never encountered at Eights Week the phenomena recounted by the Ward, Lock 'Guide to Oxford' of 1928. The "glory of creation" these days appears to consist of Laura Ashleyed hordes stumbling from one boathouse to the other in a quest for free drink with the men stumbling after in a quest for both. Somewhere, in the middle distance, there are boats; Eights - it must be affirmed - is nothing whatsoever

to do with these. It is there for the entertainment of a number of people who, for the past five weeks, have been getting up at 8.30 in the morning to operate them, cutting rather a dash as they nimbly (or otherwise) limber up in tight fitting shorts in preparation for the opportunity of boating past the people they have come to observe, upon the bank. 
