




REVIEW OF THE YEAR

Preparation for the 1982 Boat Race began in earnest back in October last year, with the newly assembled squad very much in awe of the magnificent achievements of their immediate predecessors. Under the Presidency of Chris Mahoney, Oxford had produced a crew acclaimed by the Press as perhaps "the fastest Boat Race crew of all time". Five of this crew had gone on in the summer to form a composite VIII with Thames Tradesmen Rowing Club which defeated the British National Squad in the final of the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley. Subsequently three Oxford men (Mark Andrews, John Bland and Chris Mahoney) were selected to row in the National VIII which won a silver medal for Great Britain at the 1981 World Rowing Championships.

Even to attempt to emulate such success was, to say the least, a very daunting task indeed. As the season progressed however, it became clear that Oxford would again have two extremely fast and "hungry" crews.

Cambridge, having totally rethought their training and selection procedures also produced some very strong, fit, and determined VIIIs and were utterly convinced that victory would be theirs. However on March 27th 1982, in two extremely hard fought races, Isis (the Oxford Reserves) beat Goldie by 2½ lengths; half an hour later, Oxford beat Cambridge by 3½ lengths.

With flood stream against tide, no record times were forthcoming but the Oxford stalwart Boris Rankov became the first man in history to row in and win five consecutive Boat Races!

The Oxford Lightweights suffered an unfortunate and severe blow to morale when their boat was totally destroyed in a collision during training, only three weeks before their race. In such unfortunate circumstances, they did extremely well to be beaten by only ¾ length.

The Oxford University Womens Boat Club produced two strong VIIIs but could not hope to match the wealth of experience exhibited by the Cambridge crews. The Ladies Blue Boat excelled themselves on the day and were only ¾ length down at the finish, but Osiris (the second Ladies crew) lost by 19 seconds.

The successes of the Senior Squad can once again be largely attributed to the immensely talented coaching team led by Daniel Topolski, and the dedication, hard work, and good-will of a large number of people. My special thanks though to Steve Foster, Hugh Clay and Dr J M Barry for their ardent support during an exciting and rewarding year.

This was a difficult year for us. We had no 'old Blues' and had to start from scratch. It is encouraging that a crew of our standard can be made up from college rowers and that we succeeded in pushing a far more experienced crew in their own lightweight boat so hard.

What we lacked in experience this year we did our best to make up for in fitness, strength and determination. The fact that we only lost by 3½ seconds was creditable and a tribute to the excellent coaching by Mike Rosewell at Godstow and Arthur Truswell's land training.

Such an inexperienced squad inevitably left Osiris, the second boat, in a weaker position than we would have hoped for and this was reflected in their result. The result however did not reflect the great effort that all of Osiris put into training and the race. However, having brought on so many new rowers this year we will have a very strong squad to start with next year, eager to do battle against Cambridge at Henley again.

We would like to thank O.U.B.C. for all their co-operation and support, particularly in lending us boats.

As you will have noticed this year it is not only women who can cox O.U.W.B.C. boats. I hope that college captains will make an effort to encourage all coxes as well as women rowers to become trialists and help make next year's boat one of the best yet.

The Case Against Rowing

I always wanted to go to Oxford. I knew this right from the moment I saw, live on TV, that famous Boat Race in the late 1940s when Oxford sank. Great! I thought. Here is a place that does not take sport too seriously. They're even prepared to play it for laughs. That's where I want to go.

As a preparation for going to Oxford, I was sent to a school in Scotland, called Glenalmond. It was called Glenalmond because it was set in a glen of the same name, down which rushed the rocky, furious river Almond, on which it was impossible to put anything except the kind of canoe you have to turn over in just to stay alive. No rowing or anything of that sort. Not much swimming, even, except in one rocky pool where the river calmed down for about twenty yards. I remember a friend of mine called Pattullo diving in one day and coming up with his face all red. He had broken his nose on a rock at the bottom of the river. That was when I finally *knew* that water sports were bad for you.

"Well, what do you want to do after Glenalmond?" said my housemaster to me one day.

"Please, sir, I want to go to Oxford and not row or swim or have anything to do with the water."

"Hmm. That means you'll have to do well in your 'A' Levels. Do you remember A R Muirhead, by the way?"

I dimly remembered some Old Boy of that name.

"He went to Oxford and rowed for the University, never having rowed at school. It can be done, you know."

Curse you, A R Muirhead! How could you let the side down like that?

I filled in the last years of my teens at school with some desultory athletics – a pleasant sport, athletics, rather like an energetic form of nature study. Unlike rowing, which is the only horizontal form of weight-lifting ever devised. I went in for high jumping, which is about the most condensed form of athletics there is. Not nearly as long and drawn-out as the 100 yards. If you close your eyes at the vital moment, you'd hardly even know you'd made an effort. Great sport.

I also did some research at school, mainly into finding out which college A R Muirhead had gone to, and going to another. That's how I ended up at Trinity. What I didn't know was that round about the time I had been doing my research, Trinity had been going through a golden rowing period. Head of the River, that sort of thing. By the time I got there it was all over, and Trinity was going through a decline. Great place. The only popular games were poker and bridge.

As soon as I arrived, I asked the porter which way the river was.

"That way, sir," he said, getting an underling to point for him.

"Thanks," I said, and made a note not to go that way. Thanks to this initial research, I had three successful years at Oxford; I never went on the river, not even punting, which sounded very fast and energetic to me. I did play football for Trinity once, though. They had less than eleven volunteers for the college side one day, and I was coerced into appearing on the grounds that I didn't have a broken leg. All I can remember about the game was the man playing next to me, chap called Finch, came to a complete stop after ten minutes.

"I can't take the pace," he told me, "so I'm going to have a sit-down for a while. Mark my man for me,

would you?"

He retired to the side of the pitch and sat on a bench to smoke a cigarette. That was what Trinity men were like in those days. Rugged individualists. The only conformist we had was a weedy specimen called Mike Hogan who was so unconventional that he was in danger of being picked for the 1964 Olympic team for his hurdling. Being a runner as well, he had single-handed got Trinity through to the Finals of athletics Cuppers, but unfortunately they needed a team to perform alongside him, and I found myself doing the high jump again, for the last time in my life.

That was how I met David Barlow. Barlow had volunteered for the hundred yards, being assured that even for finishing he would get points. This was a brave thing to do, as he was and is built like a shot-putter, and he had serious doubts about whether he would have the stamina to finish the 100 yards. But he did, and I can remember cheering him home, several minutes after the race had started. You know how the runners ran in Chariots of Fire? All slow motion and hardly moving? Barlow invented that. That's how he ran in real life.

I also met my wife at Oxford. Of course, she wasn't my wife when I met her. She wasn't anyone's wife - she was just a nice girl at St Hugh's. The only black mark against her was that her brother had been at Trinity and had rowed for Oxford in his first year. N Paine, if you don't believe me. How could I marry into a family like that?

"If he rowed for Oxford in his first year," I said, "he must have done well in his second and third year."
"There weren't any second and third years," she said. "He was sent down at the end of his first for not working. All that rowing, you know."

I think that just about clinches the case for the defence. I ought to add that my wife and I are no longer together, but I suppose it was my fault for marrying into a rowing family. David Barlow and I, on the other hand, are still together, playing in the same group, Instant Sunshine. I think that tends to suggest that very slow running and very low high jumping are a good basis for a relationship, rather than rowing.

I would like finally to dispel the idea that rowing provides pleasant memories to look back on in later life. About a year ago I found in the BBC Sound Archives an interview between John Snagge and the oldest living Boat Race survivor. At huge expense, and probably breaking all sorts of copyright, I have transcribed the essential part of that interview. Here it is.

Snagge: "There is still alive today an oarsman, Mr G C Dicker, who rowed for Cambridge in 1875, two years before perhaps the most famous Boat Race of all, the Dead Heat of 1877. Today Mr Dicker is ninety-six years old. He was a great oarsman in his day and his recollections of the race, though perhaps it may be many years ago and they are not as vivid as they might be, but he remembers still a great deal about it. Now Mr Dicker, you rowed number 3 in that Cambridge boat, didn't you?"

Dicker: "I'm so sorry I can't remember anything about it worth telling you."

Believe me, I shall have golden memories of low jumping.

ON SATURDAY, MAY 29,

the last night of Eights, crews from the Thames Punting Club will demonstrate the same racing punts at intervals between divisions chosen by the regatta organizers.

Three racing punts will be used, two "best and best" punts for senior and championship racing, and a 2ft wide punt, one of a matched pair, for novice racing, and for doubles racing with a crew of two standing side by side.

There are about 20 best and best punts left in existence, all built before 1914, except for four built in 1947-51. The best and best punts will be:

i. 14½in wide and 32½ft long, owned by Theo Hewitt, T.P.C. champion 1929 and 1932, and built from the trunk of a single spruce by Dunton of Shepperton, the finest of racing punt builders, about 1908, for H. J. Jaffe. (Best and best punts were also built of cedar and waney pine.)

ii. 154in wide and 35ft long, owned by and built for Nevill Miroy, T.P.C. champion 1950, by Val Wyatt of Wargrave in 1949.

The Grand Challenge Cup 1981

Last year, for the first time for many years, the O.U.B.C. managed to keep an VIII rowing on from the Boat Race and through the summer, albeit with the aid of three Olympic medallists from the Thames Tradesmen Rowing Club. The result was the capture of one of rowing's most coveted trophies, the Henley Grand Challenge Cup and the subsequent selection of three of the crew, Chris Mahoney, Mark Andrews and John Bland, to row in the Great Britain VIII which won the silver medal in the World Championships in Munich. The final of the Grand against the National Squad VIII and the return match at the National Championships, where the Squad gained their revenge by two seconds, were described by the Rowing Almanack as the "two highlights of the domestic season". The quality of the racing can be gauged from the fact that one week before the Squad had come second only to the Russians at Lucerne Regatta and had beaten the East Germans, the Olympic Champions.


And yet, for most of the summer it was touch and go as to whether the VIII would appear at all, and even a few days before Henley no-one would have given the crew any chance of winning. First of all, it was clear that even the superb Blue Boat of 1981 would not be fast enough to win, and it was necessary to find three oarsmen of sufficient calibre to provide the extra strength and experience necessary. Eventually, and not without some difficulty, it was arranged for Andrew Justice and Alan Whitwell from the silver medal Olympic VIII and Charlie Wiggin from the bronze medal pair to join the crew. Even then, it was only possible to train as an VIII once a week, and only a IV was rowing regularly, but never went well. Only after Chris Mahoney's Finals could the VIII be properly formed, but training was still intermittent with Bow waiting for the birth of his daughter and Two about to be married. Eventually, training became settled and regular, early mornings and late evenings at Pangbourne and then at Henley. It was soon obvious that the crew would be immensely powerful but would lack the finesse of the Blue Boat. It was hardly surprising that observers on the bank could write off the crew as a no-hoper.

In the first round the crew was drawn against Yale University. To our embarrassment, some of this gigantic crew could remember the fiasco two years ago when they had rowed through an unfit Blue Boat and won by several lengths; they clearly expected the same this year. In the event, the race was over by the Barrier, and Oxford/Thames Tradesmen cruised in one and a half lengths clear. The next round was a far more daunting prospect against the University of London crew who were reigning under-23 World Champions; two of the crew subsequently won a bronze medal in the coxed pair in Munich. An early lead was reduced to virtually nothing by an impressive (it impressed the present writer anyway) sustained burst

from the London crew, but John Bland at stroke was able to extract enough from the crew to get us home safely.

The final was against a Squad VIII who, as a seeded crew, had had an easy passage to the last day, and who were confident in the knowledge that they were of world class. By contrast, we had never even raced in a regatta. The race was scheduled, as always, as the main event of the final day and Princess Grace of Monaco was to be watching from the Umpire's launch. Conditions, record-breaking earlier in the week, had completely changed so that the crews would be rowing in a direct head-wind all the way. At two minutes to three o'clock both crews were in position. The Henley Start is one of the most claustrophobic in the world: the boats are aligned between Temple Island and the Berkshire bank, which is lined with spectators, and the Umpire's launch is behind; the only escape is down the course towards the finishing post, a tiny speck a mile-and-a-quarter in the distance. The Umpire rose, ran through the preliminaries, and sent off the crews exactly on time. At the first signal the Squad were bidding to go clear, and it seemed that the pundits had been right all along, but then they stuck, and then began to fall back inch by inch. It took four minutes to come level, or approximately three inches per stroke, and another minute to take a canvas. The Squad made a final push at Remenham, immediately answered by our own final push, leaving both crews to scramble home as best they could with half a length between them. My principal memory of the end of the race is the boat drifting helplessly and the entire crew weeping with exhaustion.

And so it was that Oxford University Boat Club won the Grand again for the first time since 1853. It would be a pity if we were to leave it so long until the next time.

Just a World Championship Final...?

A world championship rowing complex is a rather unusual place. It looks quite normal and "Holme Pierrepont-ish" (the British equivalent) from the gate, but once you have shown your I.D. card (how do they make you look so ugly?) to the guard and, ignoring his sniggers, entered the gate, things go a little off-beat. It's difficult to place exactly what it is but gradually it dawns upon you. That either your five-man has had too many baths recently or the Russian he's standing next to is extremely large! When that monster lumbers off and is dwarfed by an even bigger one you realize that inflating your chest — like you practised in front of the mirror last night — is something of a waste of time. By day three, you don't even bother wearing your padded tracksuit top (which you had probably traded with a Rumanian cox). One member of the crew swore that if you looked closely, you would see mould-marks on the East Germans. If they lost a race, they just took down eight new, slightly larger monsters from the racks in the boathouse.

Faced with almost one and a half stone per man disadvantage you either have to laugh or cry — so we spent most of the week before risking life and limb by sending off various members of the crew to stroll casually past the largest ogre presently in view and then collapsing into giggles at the absurdity of the difference. The ultimate was when someone discovered that he could put his feet inside the shoes of the Polish oarsmen without taking his own off.

On the water, the humour rapidly evaporates — even when you notice large cars with tinted windows following you along the course with enormous zoom lens pointing out from every window. The feeling that you are always being watched adds to the tension as everyone attempts to back up the bravado displayed on the bank by giving the opposition glimpses of what they hope looks like a mean racing machine. But although you kid yourself, you still feel chilled when you see the East German eight — with seven years of gold medals behind it — cream off the start at 45, rock steady, timing faultless, blades locked in.

The starting booms are great levellers. Looking across six lanes of eights, everywhere the tension is apparent. There are small movements throughout: bowmen keeping the boats straight, others going religiously through last-minute rituals, the tightening of stretcher-nuts, muttering to themselves.

By now you have grudgingly come to terms with the fact that there is no way you can get out of 2000 metres and (hopefully) something under six minutes of pain. You have left your nightmare of blowing up at 1500 metres behind you in the dressing room and now you just feel extremely frightened.

We sat in lane one, with the Russians in two, and beyond them the Americans, the East and West Germans and the Czechoslovakians. We and the Russians had won the two qualifying heats and so tracking our neighbours in lane two was the obvious way to start. However that would change in a moment if any other crew threatened us from across the course. All crews had admitted to being ready and the fidgeting stopped. For a long moment everything is still, even the cox is quiet. Your mind is blank and you shut out the awful prospect of what is only seconds away by concentrating on the familiar problems of the start. And then the tension explodes out of you as you move the boat past your buried blades during the first long stroke. The problem then is to keep the rating down to the lower forties as it threatens to climb through the roof. It's all too easy to use up too much vital energy by scrambling in the first 250 metres. Concentrating on every catch and telling yourself to relax between each stroke, 250 metres flashes past. You listen for the rating and are reassured when you hear that you have settled to the familiar thirty-eight. Now you can take a brief glance out of corner of your eye across the lanes at 400 metres; everyone else apart from the Russians are on the right side of us and the finish.

500 metres comes past and you have to tell yourself that it doesn't hurt because it is really beginning to. Fasten your eyes on the man ahead and concentrate on slotting in, relaxing and hitting the catch. Now with another two hundred precious metres covered you can emerge out of the web of concentration, preparing yourself to push at 850m. 850 comes and you re-row the first twenty strokes of the race. The Russian cox comes firmly back into view; then the stroke man. The East Germans are dropping back and the Americans coming through. The last of the twenty is pushed away with the remaining ounces of leg drive and you desperately drop back into the concentration pattern. Now it is getting horrific. 1000 metres have gone and burn No 2 is coming up. The Russian stroke man is still there. I can see him, the others probably can't so I grunt to John (he didn't hear me) counting down now from 20 for the second last 20 strokes of the race and you can't prevent yourself from thinking that it really is getting a bit much.

Now you can't get back into your protective cocoon of concentration. Over 1500 metres gone. The Russians only moved back a man – the Americans are a good ¾ of a length behind. Hang on for 500 metres and try to push past another Russian. It takes three hours to get 1750 metres of rowing in slow motion – knees beginning to not quite crack down against the slides, legs turning blue and vision narrowing. But now you know you can do it – 250 metres to go. All the other crews are forgotten. We just have to get there as soon as possible. Counting down now, 20, this time the real last strokes. Grandstand courses past – legs just won't go down fast enough. Two more strokes each more painful than the first 250 metres. Collapse . . .

Second . . . Oh well . . .



The Torpids

"Oxford Torpids were so named c. 1827 when Christ Church staggered humanity by putting a 2nd Crew on the river" Westm. Gaz. 24 Feb 1910.

The Torpids Races, the equivalent of the Lents of the Filth from the Fens, take place traditionally during sixth week of Hilary Term. Instituted in 1827, they are commonly judged to be the poor relation of Oxford rowing, with University oarsmen only free to compete in Autumn Fours and Summer Eights. However, even though "Torpid" crews often live up to their name, the dedication required to produce a competent 1st Torpid with limited talent available, is considerable. Oriel, one of the smallest Oxford Colleges, have not lost a major rowing event since 1977. Their 1st Torpid "comes up" two weeks before term and trains four hours a day, six days a week. This represents a commitment which approaches that of the successful Blue Boat and Isis. The training is cheerfully executed in freezing weather; (sinking near Iffley Lock, in an ice-cold fast flowing stream during January concentrates the mind wonderfully — as the Oriel Crew will readily testify.)



The Oriel College 1st Torpid. Head of the River 1982



Oriel Crews in the past have relied heavily upon the coaching of their retired waterman, Len Andrews. He knows more about rowing than any other man currently stalking the towpath of the Isis, with the possible exception of George Harris (once Christ Church boatman). Other college crews flap up and down the river at half-pressure; Len just concentrates on good technique and a fast start, essential in a race that only lasts about 4½ minutes. After a hard outing, an Oriel 1st Torpid would then do a 4 mile road run or a 1½ hour session in their heinous multi-purpose gym. Other crews train hard, but Oriel have remained Head of Torpids for the past 11 years, a record they jealously guard. In recent years, Oriel have also been grateful for the omniscience of one of their dons, Dr. W. E. Parry (Bill). At the moment combining being a University Lecturer with the Acting Provost of Oriel, he has at times seemed to run their Boat Club single handedly.

Oriel's record is impressive – no doubt about that – but it has to be said that it is very difficult for a chasing crew to bump ahead when you are near the top of Division 1. One and a half lengths clear water is a large margin to make up in such a short race, and the bladework of the chasing crew is spoiled by the wash that the leading crew sends down. This year's Keble 1st Torpid, Oriel's traditional enemies, were eight feet down on the Oriel Crew outside the boathouses, and might have taken the Headship had they known they were so close. On subsequent days rowing, however, the Oriel boat dominated.

Oriel has often been accused of being "only good at rowing because of continuing single-sex status". This is unjustified — many other colleges which are ostensibly mixed, have a much bigger pyramid base of men to choose from (e.g. Christ Church). In fact, while by no means poor academically, Oriel rely on what used to be called a "hearty" atmosphere to be able to pursue excellence on the water.
