
Being Secretary of OURCs has been a fantastic experience for me. This year I have had a great committee, hard working and highly competent.




We started the year with a strong very enthusiastic squad, who were quiet, yet hard working. They slipped into the Oxford system quickly, partly because we had so many returning from 2007. The squad lived by the phrase 'it's never enough'. Every session on and off the water. We knew we were strong but at the same time our aim wasn't just to beat Cambridge this year, it was to really hurt them by big margins, in both the Isis-Goldie race and the Boat Race.

Come January I was amazed with the progress we had made. The standard of rowing was far higher at this time of year than it had been in the previous four. Selection was looking like it would be tight. Robin, Andy and Michal all upped their game to make the Blue Boat, rowing the best I had seen them. It speaks volumes for both crews that ultimately they ended up in Isis. I was gutted for them, and the fact that they wouldn't be able to have a crack at Cambridge in the same boat as me. Even more gutted for Michal, who unfortunately got sick a few weeks before the race and decided to step down for Paul Kelly (Isis 2007).

The two boats this year were spectacular. Both Isis, and the Blue Boat won their races by 11 and 22 seconds respectively, significant margins not seen for several decades. The entire squad stood together on the podium as I lifted the trophy. For me as President the year couldn't have gone better. It was a victory for the entire squad. I said from the very beginning that my part to play in winning this race would be dedicated to the 2007 Blues. With this in mind I want to especially thank Robin, Andy and Michal for the huge roles they played this year in allowing us to take revenge for our 2007 Blue Boat.

OUWBC achieved wins for both the Blue Boat and reserve crew, Osiris, at the Henley Boat Races this year. The Blue Boat had a battle on their hands all the way down the course as they gained half a length in the first few hundred metres which they maintained to the finish. Osiris were neck and neck with Blondie until Cambridge suffered a boat stopping crab in the rough conditions, allowing Osiris to pull away. Blondie struggled to pull back lost ground and Osiris pushed away further to win with an easily verdict.

The results from Boat Race day summed up a good year for the squad. Reconvening in early September with one returning Blue and a small squad the pressure was on to start performing straight away. Crews compared favourably to their Cambridge counterparts at Fours Head in November, winning the WS3 4+ pennant and narrowly missing out on a win in Senior 2 as well. With another win at Pairs Head and a strong squad performance at the Indoor Rowing Championships, confidence was boosted as training intensity increased through the winter months.

The squad returned to Hazewinkel, Belgium for their post-Christmas training camp which kick started Hilary term in which there were match races against Furnival, OUWLRC and the old girls. Reading University Head in February saw wins for both the crews; WS1 and WS2 eights won by the Blue Boat and WS3 and WS4 eights won by Osiris. The following weekend the Blue Boat gained Headship at the Women's Eight's Head of the River three weeks prior to the Boat Races for the first time in the history of the club, beating Cambridge in 13th place by 30 seconds. Osiris came home in 40th, 4 seconds behind Blondie.

The majority of Boat Race athletes are back in training in preparation for the big events this summer, with focuses on Henley Women's Regatta, Henley Royal and National Championships under the guidance of new Head Coach Andy Green. 

The top of men's division 1 saw some truly exciting racing but relatively few bumps. Magdalen were chased hard by Pembroke but eventually prevailed to make it four in a row. Behind these two Balliol fended off a late surge from Oriel on day 4 to stay in the top 3. Oriel did manage to make up some of the ground lost in the previous year to end the week in 4th place. Univ moved up two to complete the top five. Special mention must go to Keble for being the only crew in the top two divisions to gain four places. Other successful crews in the top division were Hertford and Worcester, the latter moving up three to secure a spot in the top flight by condemning New College to the lower tier.

The women's divisions saw their fair share of controversy before even the first cannon had been fired in a row about eligibility. Once the dust had settled the outcome of that controversy mattered little as **Teddy Hall** held on to the headship for a second year regardless. Similar to the men's divisions there was no change in the top three with **Christ Church** and **Pembroke** both rowing over on all four days. Behind the three non-movers **Somerville** and **Osler-Green** gained two and three places respectively to complete the top five. What the men's divisions lacked in blades and spoons the women produced aplenty. A very strong **Balliol** gained an astonishing seven places as well as a fixed place in division one to win their oars. **Oriel** and **St. Johns** happily picked up the crews Balliol disposed of to both gain 4 places. Those gains had to come at the expense of some others with all of **New College, Queen's** and **Worcester** dropping 4 to collect spoons.



The biggest one quite possibly was that it actually happened, something not looking very likely following the serious flooding earlier in the term. Secondly both head crews lost their titles to challengers they had kept at bay the day before.

On the Thursday Magdalen ended Oriel's long run of men's headships after having been denied by a matter of inches the day before. The men in black then held on to the crown by a similarly close verdict against Pembroke on the final day. Behind them Oriel are now third followed by Christ Church who, boosted by some late OUBC additions, gained an astonishing 6 places throughout the week. Even more gains were achieved by Balliol who moved up seven and comfortably into division 1. Hertford and Teddy Hall were the other blade winners in the top divisions both making up 5 places in division 2. The week proved less successful for Worcester who ended up in division 2 following a thoroughly "spoon-worthy" drop. Special mention must also go to New College for a spectacular drop on the final day and an ejector crab on day 1. First place in the disaster scales is certainly Univ's though with a dropped division and a trashed brand new Empacher all suffered before men's Div 1 had even seen any racing at all.

On the women's side **St Catz** picked up the women's headship moving through **Queens** and **Oriel** in the process. The latter finished the week in second place with **Christ Church** taking third relegating **Queens** to fourth place. In the second half of the division it was blades galore with **Magdalen**, **Pembroke**, **New** and **Somerville** all making significant gains. **Balliol** and **Univ** managed to emulate that feat in division 2. Someone's gain has to be somebody else's loss and the one's to make way for all the blade winners include **Osler-Green**, **Worcester** and **Wolfson** who all got bumped every day.

On the 23rd of March, Oxford beat Cambridge in the University Lightweight Boat Race in a time of 6 minutes 15 seconds to record a 7th consecutive victory. In addition, Nephthys rowed over for the second year running owing to Cambridge's decision not to boat a second crew.

A strong headwind had been building throughout the day, so by 3.30pm, as the crews lined up to race, the first 500m of the course had turned into a mass of white water. Earlier in the day, Cambridge won the toss and chose to race on the Berkshire station, opting for more stream but potentially rougher water. Off the start both crews had difficulty finding a rhythm with the waves crashing around the bows and off the riggers. However, Cambridge, rating at 45 strokes per minute compared to Oxford's 41, managed to take a canvas. Throughout the enclosures, Cambridge continued to increase their lead and even tried to use their advantage to push Oxford out of the stream.

At Remenham Club, as the crews hit calmer water, Cambridge held a 2/3 of a length lead and several light blue supporters broke open the champagne ready for victory. However this proved to be a hasty move, for the Tabs had wasted too much energy early on trying to get ahead. As their rate fell, Oxford finally found their rhythm the tables began to turn. Colin Groshong, cox of the dark blue boat called for a push, and seemingly effortlessly Oxford started to move back through. Within 20 strokes, Oxford had reduced the Cambridge advantage to a quarter of a length. Cambridge tried all they could to halt Oxford's advance without success and by Fawley they were fast disappearing off the back of the Oxford boat.

Throughout the second half of the race Oxford continued to move away, putting more distance between the two crews. Although it was by no means an easy race, Oxford's dominance in the middle part of the course was reflected by the 2_length verdict. The race commentator adequately summed up the emotion on the finish line with the immortal words, "Oxford look absolutely shattered but very happy. Cambridge look equally shattered but less happy".

Race day was the culmination of 7 months of very successful training and all involved were very pleased with the outcome. The club now looks ahead to next year's boat race and there will be a meeting after VIIIs for prospective triallists. Please see www.oulrc.org or the OURCs message boards for details.



OUWLRC began the 2007-08 season at the new OUBC Boat House in Wallingford where the club has benefited all year from fantastic facilities and a great stretch of water. Keen to get lots of racing experience, the club entered a number of events early on in the season. Wallingford Long Distance Sculls saw the OUWLRC quad finish as the fastest boat on the day. Upper Thames Small Boats Head was another success with one four racing in the men's division to and finishing ahead of some of the men's crews!! With the help of our alumni we were able to boat the whole squad, some four boats, at the Fours Head of the River Race, the biggest OUWLRC entry for a number of years.

Dark evenings in Michaelmas term make it hard to get as much water time as we would like, so before finishing for Christmas, we headed to Wimbleball Lake for a four day training camp in order to gain some extra rowing time. We returned to Wimbleball in January for our main training camp which proved very successful with the squad having got to know the lake and area in December.

After training camp we trained at Wallingford for one month before moving to Upper Thames to start rowing on the boat race course at Henley. This time gave us the chance to train and race along side Upper Thames women's crews, along with boats from Reading University and the University of West England. The crew also raced at the Eights Head, the first and only chance to meet Cambridge in an eight before the Boat Race. With just three weeks left after the Eight's Head we hit training hard, getting in as much water time as possible before the race. Unfortunately our hard work was not reflected in the result on the day: Cambridge won by one second. All the training was, however, reflected in the race itself - something both the crew and many spectators acknowledged. It was a very close race all the way and I was very proud to be part of a crew that fought so hard. A History of Oxford Bumps Racing

ADAPTED FROM ANU DUDHIA'S GUIDE TO OXFORD ROWING

Rowing appears to have become popular as a recreation within the University around the end of the 1700s, whilst 'Summer Eights', is reckoned to date from the summer of 1815, a few weeks prior to the battle of Waterloo. Crews from Brasenose and Jesus, probably at the end of a day's excursion downriver, decided to race the final leg home from Iffley Lock. Brasenose won that race and are thus credited with being the first 'Head of the River'. The Isis then looked very different. There was a lock at Folly Bridge, the remains of which can still be seen today in the narrower of the two channels around the island. There were no boathouses downstream, just 'King's Barge' moored alongside Christ Church meadow. This barge, owned by the boatbuilder Isaac King, served as the finishing post for bumping races and as changing rooms by the oarsmen. The opposite bank sloped gently down to the river. There were no boathouses and the towpath between Folly and Iffley Locks was blocked by a dozen gates at various fences and bridges.

Problems caused by high winds in 1839 meant bunglines and the present 'three gun' system for starting were introduced in 1840, and the start time fixed at 7.45 pm. By then, some 14 colleges were taking part, so it was also decreed that boats involved in a bump should draw to one side so as to allow the lower crews to continue racing. The bump itself was defined 'as the touching of any part, whether it be boat, oars, or rudder'.

The boats in the early days resembled those currently used for sea-rowing: fixed seats staggered either side of a central gang-board with pins mounted directly on the opposite gunwale. Outrigged boats came into general use in Oxford in 1845; this immediately meant that boat hulls could be made narrower and lower in the water, consequently faster but less stable. It is recorded that sliding seats were used for the first time in the 1873 Eights. These originated in the United States and had been used to good effect by crews at Henley the previous summer. Crude as they were, not to mention dirty and noisy, the improvement was so evident that several colleges converted their boats between the start and finish of Eights that year. It is recorded that 'owing to a fatal accident at Cambridge', a rule was passed in 1888 obliging all boats to have an indiarubber ball fitted on the end of their bows.


Initially, coaching had been performed by the professional watermen. However, this was banned in 1846 and the duty subsequently fell to the coxswains, the stated argument being 'A coxswain ought to be a thinking, reasoning being, in a higher degree than any waterman has yet shown himself to be'. However, as boats got lighter, coxes began to be selected for their lightness rather than their coaching ability, and coaching as an activity was transferred once again to the towpath, which was completed in its current raised shape in 1872. In 1882, the Oxford University Boathouse was added and in 1886 Folly Bridge lock was removed.

Returning coaching to the bank led to different problems; the Thames Conservancy only permitted one horse on the towpath (for the coach of the University crew), so the only option was having someone run alongside. As often as not, this led to the unsatisfactory situation of the College Eight being coached by people fit enough to keep up with the crew rather than

knowledgeable enough to make the crew move quicker. Mercifully, in 1889, the bicycle arrived on the towpath, followed shortly by the megaphone, and with these new inventions came a new breed of coaches whose status came by virtue of their knowledge rather than their running ability.

Christ Church built the first college boathouse, at the downstream end of the island, at the end of the 1930's and over the next couple of decades the island filled with new boathouses, usually shared by 2 or 3 colleges. The last boathouse was added only relatively recently, in 1989, filling the one remaining space at the upstream end of the island. With the move to boathouses, the barges became superfluous and were gradually sold off; the last, owned by St Catherine's, finally disappearing at the end of the 1970's. One of them can be found in the Oxford Four Pillars Hotel grounds these days.

Women's crews from Oxford and Cambridge first rowed against each other in 1927, the competition being in the form of a half-mile row along the Isis, judged on style as much as on speed. Clearly, there had been some concern over the undignified spectacle that might have arisen had these young ladies been asked to compete on the basis of speed alone. St Hilda's did raise a few eyebrows when their crew successfully 'Rowed On' for Eights in 1969 and competed with the men's crews in Division VIII. By 1976 women had their own division in Summer Eights with Lady Margaret Hall starting as the first women's Head Crew.



Divisions had to be shortened between 1961–62 to allow for the construction of Donnington Bridge, and the 1963 Torpids were cancelled altogether due to the river being frozen. In the 1980s the increased concern for safety also played a part; today it is extremely unusual to find a student who has experienced the dubious pleasure of being stuck against the piles above liftley Lock, whereas it used to be a common enough occurrence for various methods of extraction to be tried and discussed.

Following the so-called 'Boat Race Mutiny' of 1987, there was a major overhaul of the organisation of Oxford rowing, largely prompted by the desire to limit the powers of the President of OUBC and to put the other University squads (OUWBC and the two lightweight squads) on a more equal footing. Since its formation in 1839, the OUBC Committee had nominally been responsible for running Oxford college rowing, but with the formation of 'Oxford University Rowing Clubs' in 1987 these functions were taken over by the OURCs Secretary and committee, with OUBC mostly left to concentrate on the University crew.



A Guide to Oxford Bumps Racing

Bumps racing on the Isis evolved because the river is too narrow to race two eights side by side down its length. The first races were casual challenges between colleges in the early 1800s, with crews starting from Iffley lock and racing back to the city. In 1825, there were too many boats to start from within the lock and the crews started from posts on the bank 50ft apart.


These days, crews start lined up with their coxes holding ropes known as 'bunglines' attached to the bank at intervals of about 1.5 boat lengths. As there are far more boats than space on the river, crews set off in divisions, although time constraints still mean that some boats have to qualify. This occurs on the Friday before Eights, when boats are timed down the bumps course. Boats are positioned with the aid of a poleman, often the college boatman, who attempts to get the best possible position for his crew before racing starts upon the firing of a cannon. The aim for each boat is, of course, to bump the boat in front before being bumped by the boat behind. This either involves physical contact or the concession of the cox in front.

If a bump occurs, both crews stop rowing and move out of the racing line. They then swap places in the next day's starting order, or if the bump occurs on the last day, the next year's starting order. The winner of each division proceeds to row at the bottom of the following division as a 'sandwich boat'. A crew's aim each year is to bump on each of the four days, thus winning 'blades' but the ultimate aim of a crew is to become 'Head of the River'. Either feat entitles the crew to commission trophy oars illuminated with the names of the crew and the college colours.

The earliest recorded rules date from 1840, although they have been in constant flux ever since. The rules remain under the control of the Oxford University Rowing Clubs (OURCs), made up of the college captains and elected officials, who organise and run the bumps competitions. Discipline is maintained by the use of fines for ungentlemanly behaviour and unsafe conduct.

Torpids, the easter bumps races, originated as separate races for college second crews. Over time, they have evolved into a similar event to Eights week, with two important differences. As the event occurs so close to the university boat races against Cambridge, current university rowers are not allowed to compete. Also, bumped crews do not stop rowing, raising the possibility of being bumped more than once.

Because the event is raced upstream, the normal racing line avoids the centre of the river and therefore the strongest current. This requires crews coming out of the gut to hug the Green Bank (see map) until they cross the stream to come onto the towpath side before the boathouses. As the river widens at this point, a skilled cox can avoid a faster crew by 'running' across the river, thus slowing the following boat as it makes heavier use of the rudder. Each crew is followed by an umpire and coach on bicycles, meaning that when a division is being rowed, the centre of the towpath must be kept clear for umpire's bicycles.





The New Home of Oxford University Rowing

I'm sitting on the balcony with a cup of tea, looking over the stunning river and floodplain at Wallingford and talking to Pat Lockley, the OUBC Boathouse manager. For those of you lucky enough to have been here, you'll know what I mean when I say that 'amazing' doesn't really begin to describe it.

The first mention I can find minuted about a boathouse at Wallingford for OUBC is in 1996, though doubtless, talks started much earlier. Various locations were considered and plans put forward, and in 2001 the current site was purchased, though building would not start for another four years. A year and some £4.5 million later, OUBC moved in.

The plan is to eventually house all four University Boat Clubs, though currently the only club missing is OUWBC, who still row from Radley. Wallingford boasts the longest lock to lock stretch of river on the non-tidal Thames, an uninterrupted 10km.


The boat bay stores OUBC's extensive fleet of 4 eights, 4 coxed fours, 2 coxless fours, eight singles and 10 pairs. The club's three launches and 'Bosphorous' (one of the launches that follows the Boat Race and Henley Royal Regatta) are stored in the wet boathouse on the other side of the building. OULRC and OUWLRC store their training boats in the 'shed', the building that housed OUBC until the project was completed. Their racing shells are stored in the main boathouse and their launches are parked along the river bank.

But it's not only the size and location of the boathouse that is impressive. The building itself is quite spectacular. All the doors are 7ft (2.3m) high, to accommodate the somewhat taller than average rowers that pass through them. The building is raised 1.5m above ground to comply with flooding regulations, so that in the case of the largest ever recorded flood (1947), the major part of the boathouse would remain dry. On a flood plain, that's pretty impressive. Next to the boat bay is Pat's workshop – large enough to drive a fully loaded trailer into it or to work on 2 eights, fully rigged, side by side. The changing room has lockers for every member that turns up to trial in September, the drying room pumps hot air in and extracts soggy air out to dry kit after an outing in the pouring rain. Undoubtedly though my favourite part of the boathouse has to be the dyson hand-driers that 'create a high velocity blade of air that wipes hands dry in just 10 seconds' – honestly, you have to see these things. Plus there's no denying, it really is a rather beautiful building. Not only is the architecture very sympathetic to the surroundings, but the walls indoors are littered with old photos and paintings from OUBC's rich past.


The 'Isis' room, OUBC's crew room is also home to the OUBC archive. Whilst most of the club's written history went up in flames in the fire of September 1999, memorabilia has been donated from various sources. In a shameless plug for their archive, if you are, or someone you know is, sitting on any memorabilia that you would be willing to share, OUBC would be very happy to hear from you.


The Boathouse has also provided a hub for alumni activity, hosting President's drinks, boat naming ceremonies (for the all the four squads) and various other current blues and alumni events. The highlight of these have been races between the current squad and a mix of old boys including Dan Topolski, world champions Pete Reed and Andy Triggs-Hodge, and a guest appearance by the 1960 Blue Boat come British Olympic Eight.

There are future plans too, for refurbishing the shed, adding to the landscaping, internal furnishing including flat screen TVs for watching recorded footage of outings and honour boards for past presidents. All in all, you can't help but feel a sense of awe when walking around the building, but then I suppose that's the point.









An Interview with Mike Wherley

Being a World Champion – in the flagship US VIII for three successive years between 1997 and 1999 – and having represented the US in the IV- at the Sydney and Athens Olympics, you would be forgiven for thinking that at 36 Mike Wherley would be ready to hang up his oar. Coming to Oxford in 2007 to study for the MSc in Financial Economics however, Wherley had other ideas, setting his sights on one more challenge on the water. On 29th March 2008, he achieved victory rowing at 5 in Oxford's Blue Boat against Cambridge in the 154th University Boat Race, and in so doing became the oldest oarsman to row in and win the Boat Race.

Reflecting back on that day, and the 7 months of hard training building up to it, Wherley describes the experience as amazing, better even than he had envisaged back in September. Crossing the line was surreal – the first thought he had was that he had just finished what was probably his last major race – though the ecstasy of victory soon began to sink in. In post-race interviews his competitive side emerged, as he described how when the opportunity came, Oxford "really stepped on the necks" of the Cambridge crew. Wherley talks of the unified and friendly nature of the OUBC squad, which he compares favourably to what he perceives to be a more cut-throat competitiveness in the national squads. He has enjoyed working with Sean [Bowden, the OUBC Head Coach] and the squad, and would still have got a lot out of the year and enjoyed it even had Oxford lost – though maybe not quite as much!

The OUBC training programme is inevitably not as intense as a national programme. For instance, Jürgen [Gröbler, the GB Head Coach] makes his athletes train 18–20 times a week. Even so, Wherley has often found himself exhausted this year, balancing training with his full-time studies. The programme is very thorough, covering every angle of the very unique race OUBC prepare for. In contrast to his experiences with the US squad, when crews were often selected very close to the major championships, Wherley feels Oxford's crews were completely prepared come race day.

The OUBC programme is very good preparation for rowers hoping to make the step up to the national squads, as evident from the large number of Oxbridge graduates in the GB, and other national, squads going into the Beijing Olympics. Wherley believes that every member of the 2008 Blue Boat – with the exception of himself and Jan Herzog who are coming to the end of their careers, having already competed at the Olympics – has the ability to go on and represent his country at senior level.

The biggest challenge for them, according to him, will be to keep their hunger and stay mentally strong for the whole four year cycle building up to London 2012. Wherley's own strategy for staying in the game was to take each day as it came, not looking too far ahead to the final race. Every day, every session, he pushed himself to beat his own personal bests and to be better than his rivals. He was lucky in being able to hold down a full-time job alongside training with the US squad, which the top rowers in Britain at the moment are not able to do. He feels this enabled him to switch off from rowing and get away from the river and the ergo for a bit.

Wherley, who began rowing when at university in Minnesota, has advice for college rowers aiming for OUBC and beyond. You have to be very self-critical and be able to smooth out the highs and the lows of training and racing. Pulling a pb on the ergo today counts for nothing tomorrow, and equally, a bad session cannot be allowed to affect subsequent training.

Looking ahead to Summer Eights, Wherley is excited by the prospect of racing again. As soon as he decided to come to Oxford, he wanted to race in bumps: the electricity on the start line in front of upwards of 15,000 spectators; the unpredictable nature of such racing, in which it could all be over in less than a minute. He admits he is looking forward to taking on, and hopefully beating, some of his fellow OUBC squad members. It will be quite fitting for Wherley to end his illustrious career, which has seen him crowned US Rowing Athlete of the Year in 2000, back at the grassroots of the sport.

Those interested in the complete statistical background of the predicting system are referred to the original page. At this point it suffices to say that any "pundit" can supply their estimates of a crews speed with 6.0 being an average Div 1 crew. The different estimates are then weighted by how competent your predictions proved in the past. Using the average scores and some randomly created "form on the day" component bumps racing is "simulated". An 0.3 point difference leads to a bump and you can see what came out of it.




